Aggressive Dog Policy: If any dogs display signs of aggression towards people or other canine guests, we will not be able to board or host your pet for doggy daycare. Necessary interaction with your dog is required on a daily basis (feeding, exercise, and cleaning). Your pet must be social with humans and dogs in order with us or participate in doggy day care. These requirements are for the safety of humans and dogs alike. Thank you for your understanding.

Doggy Daycare & Dog Lodging Agreement

This is an agreement between Pet Sitting & Dog Lodging LLC (hereinafter called "Free Paws") and the pet owner whose signature appears below (hereinafter called "Owner"). This agreement shall be valid from the date signed for their dogs and will remain on file until the relationship is terminated in writing.

Owner understands that the concept of doggy daycare and social dog lodging is to allow dogs to interact with other dogs and participate in supervised “country style” activities. While all dogs are required to have a current rabies vaccination or titer to participate in Doggy Day Care or Dog Lodging, there is always a risk of communicable diseases such as intestinal parasites, heartworms, kennel cough, bacteria, or infections from other canine guests, farm animals, fowl, and livestock.

Dogs may swim, splash, and frolic in the water during which time water may enter the ear canal and may possibly cause an ear infection. Most dogs react by shaking their heads to remove any water from the ear canal. However, small amounts of pool water may remain in the canal which may cause or exacerbate an already existing ear infection. Unfortunately, we cannot predict which dogs may be more prone to an infection, but we do realize the sporting-type dogs, Golden Retrievers, Labs, or those dogs with floppy-type ears are more prone to ear infections. As a result of ear irritation, dogs will sometimes scratch at their ears. During the scratching process, without them realizing it, they will cause minor skin irritation below the ear or around the neck area. The more dogs scratch, the more irritated the skin around the ear or neck becomes resulting in what is commonly called a “Hot Spot.” Ear infections and the resulting hot spot are beyond our control and are a result of the self-inflicted scratching. Free Paws does not give a hotspot to your dog. Hot spots and/or infections usually necessitate veterinary care and may get larger if not treated. Another thing to watch out for is paw burns or abrasions from contact with hot cement or other surfaces. Dogs with sensitive feet, a wild play style, particularly sensitive skin, or those who are not accustomed to water play can develop cracks or blisters on their pads. Even a tiny crack or blister can cause a dog to limp or lick their paws.

By signing this agreement, you have been made aware that hot spots, dog-to-dog related injuries or illness, and/or sore paw pads can be a common occurrence during the hot humid months of summer or any time of the year. Although Free Paws will take normal precautions to prevent ear infection, hot spot, dog-to-dog related injury, or a paw pad abrasion may result from daily exposure to the daycare environment. If your dog is prone to ear infections, does not like socializing with other dogs, or has sensitive paw pads, reducing the number of days your dog participates in daycare or providing ear wash is a good way to reduce a chance of an ear infection and accompanying hot spot or sore paw pad.

Owner agrees to hold Free Paws harmless for such conditions and agrees that the Owner will accept all responsibility for the veterinary costs associated with the treatment of any dog-to-dog related injuries, ear infection, paw pad abrasion, other illness or injury obtained from Free Paws, and/or accompanying hot spots.
